

From behind the goal

Wembley 1-2 Epsom & Ewell – Combined Counties League Saturday 25th September 2010

Epsom and Ewell made it two wins on the spin, and their third in a row at Vale Farm with a well-earned 2-1 win. Matt Smith came into the line up in place of the absent Kyle Hough, while Tommy Moorhouse reclaimed the captaincy as he took the place of Tony Cuff, who I believe was suspended.

Otherwise it was the same eleven that started at Cove on Tuesday and we gained an identical result with some hard work and incisive play on a typically perfect Wembley pitch. The game didn't open that well though. Paul Borg was forced into a low save after seven minutes and the hosts were just over with another shot a few minutes later.

However, it was Epsom who scored against the run of play with their first real attack, unofficially after 12 minutes. The excellent Terry Fennessey made ground down the left wing and Mark Jarman dispatched his perfect cross with a downward header.

If that was harsh on Wembley, the next twenty minutes was totally dominated by the Blues. Moorhouse and Jarman combined well down the left, and as Moorhouse delivered a cross into the danger area, a late challenge on him in the area was missed entirely by the referee. Moments later there was a scramble in front of goal as Jarman was through but got his feet caught under the ball and the keeper recovered his ground to claim the ball.

Other half chances and good positions came to little but it was still all Epsom, with Wembley being restricted to a few long range shots. Ben Hayward had a low drive well saved after 41 minutes from a Smith right wing cross that Moorhouse had stepped over, and it was therefore the home team's turn to score against the run of play when they equalised after 43 minutes with a deep corner that dropped over Borg and into the back of the net.

Early in the second half Moorhouse was in the clear, and with the keeper exposed he chose to lob him, but with the breeze in our favour it carried the ball just beyond the bar, being expertly caught behind the goal by the regular suspects behind the goal! Wembley had a free kick well struck but just too high after 52 minutes, while Moorhouse, clearly enjoying his more advanced role was high and wide from a fairly good position.

Alex McGregor came on for Smith, and although Smith had done little wrong, there was more energy about the Epsom team from that point forward. Jarman was having his best game of the season and was well supported by Fennessey on the left, who was brought down by the Wembley number 5 who was booked. Alex Rodrigues also went into the book ten minutes later for complaining to the referee but his protests were entirely justified as the referee had missed another late challenge, this time on Hatfield.

With twenty minutes to go we continued to press and Fennessey couldn't quite reach an excellent Jarman cross. Borg was forced into a low save, but the Epsom counter attack from his clearance earned us a corner. Matt Fowler replaced the tiring Hayward and Dean Sammut came on for the battered and bruised Hatfield, but it was looking as though we would only have a point to show for it. Moorhouse ran with the ball as the Blues had a four on three situation but his pass was over hit and ran out for a goal kick.

With eight minutes remaining though we made what proved to be the key breakthrough in the match. A deep corner was well challenged for, and the half clearance fell to Jamie Reive who hooked the ball in left-footed from about ten yards out. It was one of those chances where we were behind the goal and close to the action but lose sight of the ball, which then magically appears in the top corner!

Fowler just had time to go in the book after trying to reposition a Wembley free kick, and there was also time for the referee to miss another good penalty shout that occurred right in front of him. The contact was late and must have been heard across the ground, but he played on, and the final chance of the match was gone. Fortunately the decision did not cost us this time as we recorded our first away league win since our 3-0 win at Croydon back in August.

From behind the goal

Badshot Lea 4-0 Epsom & Ewell – Combined Counties League Saturday 2nd October 2010

Three late goals at Badshot Lea put an unfair gloss on what was a competitive match for the majority of the game.

Darren Smith returned to the side in place of the absent Tommy Moorhouse, but otherwise it was the same eleven that had deservedly won 2-1 at Wembley last week.

The first twenty-five minutes was almost all Epsom. Alex McGregor skied a volley over after four minutes, whilst Joe Paris had a low shot deflected wide not long later. Generally there was a lot of pressure on the home team's back four with Mark Jarman prominent and Terry Fennessey having a lot of the ball on the left.

It was extremely harsh then to go behind after 26 minutes with a shot that seemed to creep past Paul Borg and in at the near post. The game changed in that moment. Although Paris was just over with an overhead kick, and Smith volleyed inches over, the balance of the game swung permanently towards the visitors. Borg made several good saves, and McGregor (I think) made a good goal line clearance as the Blues hung on a bit until the half time whistle blew.

Borg made another save early in the second period, and moments later a home player rounded him but was unable to put the ball on target with his weaker foot. Borg just got a piece of the ball after a poor crossfield pass was intercepted by a Badshot player, who went down in the area and required treatment.

If we had received the benefit of the doubt there, it was taken away again on 72 minutes. Moments before, Fennessey's shot had beaten the Badshot keeper but been cleared away, and from the counter attack the number 12 was one on one against Alex Rodrigues. From where we were, it looked as though Rodrigues made a great block, but the referee awarded a penalty, for what he deemed to be holding by our Captain who was then booked. This was really harsh, and Jamie Reive was booked for his protests before the penalty was scored, despite Borg getting a piece of it.

We had a penalty shout of our own when Smith's shot was blocked out for a corner, but after 81 minutes we conceded a third goal from a pinpoint right wing cross. The header was glanced past Borg and in off the far post. In the final moments, we were pushing upfield, and on the break substitute Dean Sammut had two men to deal with. They played it neatly around him and Borg was beaten for a fourth time.

In summary, we did not deserve to lose so convincingly, but it has to be said that we didn't make enough of our opening dominance, and paid a very heavy price for it later on.

From behind the goal

Epsom & Ewell 2-2 Worcester Park a.e.t. *Epsom won 5-3 on penalties* Combined Counties League Cup Second Round Tuesday 5th October 2010

The Blues dug themselves out of a hole on Tuesday evening, and just as it looked like they were about to clamber out, they slipped back in, requiring the lottery of a penalty shoot out to progress in the end.

And I really need to start with that penalty shoot out here. For years now we have been totally reliant on penalty king Kyle Hough tucking away our spot kicks, but I reckon he had been coaching our other players too, as we scored all five. In fact I doubt whether a professional keeper could have stopped any of them. Also, Paul Borg saved one kick and got a hand to two others as he performed heroics in front of the massed supporters as the church end of the ground.

It was also the first time in the club's history that they had won a competitive penalty shoot out, following losses at Egham (2003), Molesey (1994) and Walton & Hersham (1984). Unfortunately, the rest of the game was less inspiring from an Epsom point of view as they struggled at times against a high tempo visiting team that were full of confidence, as befits a team in their League position.

In terms of personnel, Tommy Moorhouse returned to the line up, as did Kyle Hough. They took the place of the suspended pair Darren Smith and Joe Paris, while Matt Smith was preferred to Alex McGregor on the right hand side of midfield.

After a bright first ten minutes with Mark Jarman nearly scoring in the first minute, we fell away badly and produced our worst football all season. Every time we got hold of the ball, it was heaved 50 yards or more in the direction of Terry Fennessey, who was the only available man out on the left. All the pretty passing seemed to be a thing of the past as the visitors grew in belief. They clipped the bar with a fine strike from thirty yards out on the half hour, and took the lead just before half time when the eleven had far too much room on the edge of the area, and curled his shot beyond Borg.

On a frustrating evening, some erratic decisions were beginning to annoy both sets of players, but being behind was no more than we deserved. Fortunately the second half was much better as Epsom reverted to playing more thoughtful passes. We were given a little help with our equaliser after 54 minutes, although it was largely down to good work on the right from Jarman. He burst through, beating his defender, and although his cross was not the greatest, it was half cleared to another defender who then sliced the ball completely, even wrong footing his own keeper, and Hough ran on to the loose ball and tapped it in from close range.

Matt Fowler entered the fray a little earlier than in recent matches and showed some good touches, while Jamie Reive was just wide with a header from a corner. After 77 minutes, a terrible challenge, but best described as more clumsy than malicious almost sparked a player brawl as our man went flying up in the air, and the visiting number 7 received a yellow card for it. Moments later Ben Hayward broke through, but the visiting keeper did well to push him out wide, and his cross was cleared. Right near the end Borg made a good save with his legs and Moorhouse had his header from a Fennessey corner blocked off the line before the whistle blew for extra time.

We were out of the blocks straight away as the visitors appeared to tire. Fennessey was just wide with a long-range effort, but the Park defence did not deal with a free kick after 92 minutes and Moorhouse slammed the loose ball home. Five minutes later Jarman would have been clean through but was flattened by a defender. The referee did not seem to see anything wrong with this challenge and compounded his error by booking our frustrated and protesting player.

Another poor challenge from the visitors received a yellow card and at half time of extra time there was only one team in it. But there was one more twist. Former Epsom player Nick Drew had come on as a substitute and he struck the ball into the corner when he was not closed down only moments after the restart. In the final minute we had a massive escape when Worcester Park hit the post, and the follow up from close range hit the bar and went over.

So the Blues progressed to the last 16, eventually, but the performance was for large periods of the game quite poor, and we will need to play better today if we are to defeat Molesey.

A record crowd of 1,200 were present said the local papers, which was impressive enough, until you realise that Walton & Hershams were playing Southampton in the F.A. Cup that day. The Molesey programme refers to their






Above L-R - Molesey v Epsom (AC) 1960, Epsom v Molesey (SSC) 1962, Molesey v Epsom (AC) 1963

We lost there again in another Amateur Cup tie in 1965, but finally broke the run in that competition three years later, where we got a draw at Molesey and squeezed home 1-0 after extra time, thanks to a Ken Jolly goal. If anyone from Molesey has a spare copy, or even a photocopy of the 1968 game at Walton Lane, I would be very grateful!

Following this, we had a break of six years before meeting at Molesey once again for a Surrey Senior Cup tie in 1974. Back then, they were the senior team, as we were Surrey Senior League by then, but we had a good team that year and won 2-1 with goals from Johnny Eales and Tommy Tuite. For 1975/76 though we were equals and met twice in the Athenian League Division Two. Molesey won in December by a goal to nil, but we returned the favour at West Street in the January of 1976 by a score of 2-1.



Molesey's programme cover was unchanged for the two games in 1974 and 1975, while the Epsom programme was our standard 1975/76 issue.

The Blues were promoted that season to the Athenian League Division One, so you would have not expected the two to meet. However, we met in two cups, the first of which was highly controversial when Molesey defeated us in the F.A.Vase by two goals to one. It was the manner of the winning goal that left a sore taste, and my fellow "behind the goal" boy Steve Davies recalls it as if it were yesterday. Apparently the referee blew for offside but then allowed the Molesey goal to stand.

Returning there in March 1977 for an Athenian League Cup tie, a 64th minute Tommy Tuite goal was the difference between the sides as the Blues eventually reached the Final, losing out to Chalfont St Peter at the Playing Fields by one goal to nil.

Both sides were promoted into the Isthmian League Division Two, where Epsom & Ewell would become Champions, but yet again the Moles held their own in their home game by three goals to two, while we defeated them 4-2 in an early match in August 1977.

Whilst the lads continued to toil against a hard working Worcester Park outfit, conversation returned to the running theme of the night - Rachel Riley, Carol Vorderman's replacement on Countdown. I honestly can't tell you how, for well over two hours, Rachel became the focal part of our terrace banter. And, I'm not going to mention the truly awful "I'll have 2 from the top and 1 from the bottom joke" that did the rounds – oops!

Anyway, eventually the game went to penalties and once again the crowd behind the Church End swelled well into double figures (11 – Ed). Suddenly the entertainment was once again on the pitch and we were all treated to a penalty master class from the lads. Similarly Paul Borg was also outstanding, saving one spot kick and very nearly saving two others.

So, at just after 10.30pm, I went home happy having seen Epsom progress to the last 16 of the League Cup and having had a laugh with my mates. However our victory over Worcester Park was to become even sweeter.

Whilst watching Countdown the following afternoon I stared in disbelief as Rachel Riley pulled out five consonants and three vowels from her drawer that will strike a cord with all who watched the Worcester Park game. As Harry Hill would say, "what are the chances of that?"



Following our promotion in 1978, we had no contact with the Moles until we dropped into the Isthmian League Division Two South in 1987 for two League matches. I shall cover those in more detail should we play Molesey next season. However, before we met in the League, an F.A.Cup win at home to Arundel ensured that we were drawn at Walton Lane for the next round.

Ironically that summer Tommy Tuite, our record breaking striker had moved there in a partly coaching role, so we faced him for the first, and I believe only time, as I don't recall him playing in the two League matches.

Here is a picture of him winning a penalty in that match, but we still won 2-1 with goals from Brian Perkins and Chris Holding.



On This Day - 9th October

84 years ago today we had an Amateur Cup tie against Aquarius. For those who've seen the A-Z feature recently, you will know that they were the works side of the Water Board and played in Honor Oak. However, for "gate" purposes this game was switched to West Street, and Reg Marlow scored twice in a comfortable 2-0 win.

62 years ago today future Manager Fred Chitty, and Jackie Collins D.F.C. were the scorers as Surrey Senior League Chertsey Town were seen off in an Amateur Cup Replay following a 2-2 draw at Alwyns Lane the previous Saturday.

26 years ago today I recall getting down to Meadowbank very early from work, and witnessing a fine 4-0 win over Dorking. It was our first season in the Isthmian Premier Division and we were expected to beat our Division Two opponents, but it took a while before we were able to put them away, only leading by a single goal at the break.

8 years ago today we finished off the challenge from Fleet Town in an F.A.Trophy replay after we should have won the first match but had to settle for a 1-1 draw. This win gave us a match at Egham against Staines Town, and this led to a famous trip to play Newport County a few weeks later.

3 years ago today goals from Kyle Hough and Robbie Burns ended the Camberley threat and put us through to the Third Round of the League Cup.

the London League. Bearing in mind that they used to play in all conditions back then, one wonders how bad it must have been, and this was in April, not January! So we played them at West Street twice, winning both games 6-3 in the switched match (with Parker and Parr both getting hat tricks) and 4-2 in the second, played some nine days later on 21st April.

We did the double over them in 1931/32 by 4-0 and 3-0 as we finished runners up, and also won 7-2 at West Street in 1932/33, but a Bob Gates missed penalty cost us dear as we were held goalless at Beckenham, and it was the runners up spot again.

Beckenham were relegated to Division One of the London League, (where even our Reserves shared the four League matches over the next two seasons) and were relegated out of the League entirely in 1935. We didn't meet again until 1955 for a friendly that we won 5-1. The name of the club was still Beckenham, but they had moved to their current ground Stanhope Grove by that time.

By October of 1977 though, they had added the "Town" suffix, and knocked us out of the London Senior Cup at Stanhope Grove with the only goal of the game. Two seasons later we got our own back in the same contest by two goals to nil at Beckenham, and we drew them away once again in the London Senior Cup in February 1988, but the midweek date meant that they had to concede home advantage and we crushed them 5-1 at West Street with Brian Perkins getting a hat trick.

We haven't met since then, but of course will be meeting them shortly at Moatside for a Surrey Senior Cup tie. Yes, I know they are based in Kent. I don't make the draws!!

Beckton Town: - Played 1 - W1, D0, L0 - F1, A0 - Points per Game - 3.00 - Perfect

Our 4-3 win at Ruislip Manor in October 1982 (one of our 100 Memorable Matches) earned us a trip to Beckton Town played in the London Spartan League, and were a long way from the nearest train station, which was Barking. Myself, John Steinmetz and Gary Vickers, a former long-serving supporter did the three mile run to East Ham Manor Way in the pre-Docklands Light Railway days and witnessed a dour struggle that was settled with a Steve Hill penalty.

The club did not survive much longer, and I believe that the site is now used as a golf driving range.

Beddington Corner: - Played 3 - W3, D0, L0 - F14, A6 - Points per Game - 3.00 - Perfect

We only met our local rivals three times, and I must admit that I know little about them, except that they appeared in the Surrey Senior League from 1928 to 1937 and played in Beddington Park. We never went there, as all three matches were played at West Street. The first one was a huge 8-3 win in the F.A.Cup, with Reg Marlow scoring four times, and Reg Stimson getting two of the others.

The next time we met was far more significant. It was late October 1933 and it was F.A.Cup time. We had already defeated Isthmian League sides Woking and Nunhead, and also Tooting & Mitcham United, so it was a bit of a surprise to come up against little Beddington Corner at that stage. We were actually drawn away from home, but the game was switched for "gate" purposes and it was just as well, as it was a tight game, drawing 1-1 at half time. An early Graves goal put us ahead and we won 4-2 in the end, eventually reaching the First Round Proper and a match with Clapton Orient.

Our final meeting was a Surrey Senior Cup-tie in 1936, where we trailed at half time but won 2-1.

Every Opponent A-Z



Over the years we have played many, many different opponents. Exactly how many is a difficult question, as it all depends on your definition. Are Camberley and Yorktown different to Camberley Town, or are Epsom Town different to Epsom F.C. or Epsom & Ewell F.C.?

In my analysis I have classed them as the same team, and will work through them all from A to Z. Some we have played many times, whilst others maybe just once or twice. Enjoy!

Basildon United: - Played 2 - W1, D0, L1 - F3, A1 - Points per Game - 1.50 - Average

We met Basildon twice in Isthmian League action following our relegation from the Premier Division. We only met twice as we were relegated at the end of the season to Division Two South and never met again!

In fact we were relegated in unusual circumstances at Gardiners Close, as we travelled there for the final match of the season. We had a dreadful start to the season, and new Manager Ricky Kidd had steadied the ship. 1987 was much better and we were one of the form teams by the end of the season. However, we required a 4-0 win at least to have a chance of survival, but despite dominating, we were only able to win 3-0.

Oxford City and Walton & Hersham had a match left at the end of the season, and they each needed a point to send both us and Tilbury down, which they unsurprisingly secured a few days later. Had we scored a fourth at Basildon though, the goal difference would have forced them to play for a result.

The League table was odd too. We were out of the relegation zone after this win, but were definitely relegated! I suppose this was also in part due to the late penalty winner that Basildon got at our place earlier in the season, when they nicked a 1-0 win.

Basingstoke Town: - Played 1 - W1, D0, L0 - F3, A0 - Points per Game - 3.00 - Perfect

In 1985/86 we defeated Kingstonian by five goals to one in an F.A. Trophy match, and the reward was a home tie against Southern Premier League side Basingstoke Town.

We were a poor side that year, relatively speaking, and we finished bottom of the Isthmian League Premier Division, but the Trophy gave light relief and our win here put us through to a match with Division One Grays Athletic. Typically for that season, we blew that one in extra time of the replay!

Beckenham / Beckenham Town: - Played 12 - W9, D1, L2 - F44, A16 Points per Game - 2.33 - Fantastic

There were two main incarnations of Beckenham; one in the thirties that we played in the London League, and the more recent side that we have played over the last thirty years.

We first played Beckenham on 19th January 1929, and although we were level at the half at 2-2, we ran away with it in the second period, winning 7-3 with Reg Marlow scoring four times. We slipped up 3-1 in the return at their old ground in Balmoral Avenue, although we didn't go there in 1929/30 as their ground was deemed as unfit by

This Week in History

90 years ago this week we were defeating Banstead by two goals to one in the Sutton & District League at the Epsom Recreation Ground. However, this was not the Banstead that we know today, nor was it one of the hospital sides I have referred to recently. This was just an earlier incarnation of their town club.

80 years ago this week we were drawn away from home to West Norwood in the Amateur Cup, but they had no ground at the time and so the tie was switched to West Street, where home advantage just about made the difference. A penalty from "Brother" George Mackesy and two from flying right-winger Freddie Behn got us through after we trailed 2-1 at the half. Eventually we would reach the First Round Proper for the first time in the clubs history, at one point leading holders Ilford 2-0 at West Street before collapsing to a 5-2 defeat.

70 years ago this week Epsom Town recovered from two-nil down to draw 3-3 at home to Erith & Belvedere, and actually hit the bar with a penalty near the end!

60 years ago this week player / coach Sid Faggetter scored four times in an Amateur Cup romp over Cobham, who had no answer and crumbled 7-2. Pat Jordan scored twice and Tommy Wright completed the scoring.

10 years ago this week we were defeated 2-1 at Arlesey Town, with both home goals being scored by a young lad by the name of Dave Kitson.


Eversley were second before the weekend matches but South Park defeated them 2-0 at home, and we could see too "Parks" in the top three at the end of the season.

The game erupted 15 minutes or so into the second half as Jimmy collected the ball just before the Harwich forward could get a touch to it, and instead he caught Jimmy on the left ankle and then his momentum caused him to tumble to the ground. As he picked himself up and started to jog back to the half way line Jimmy stuck out a foot and kicked him back. Unfortunately the linesman witnessed this and raised his flag.

Ref consulted linesman, Jimmy sent off, penalty awarded, trouble breaks out behind the goal. A home supporter flattened one of the Max Wall's and another of the great comedian's look-alikes returns the compliment on another home supporter who beetled off to complain to the stewards.

In the ensuing melée the weak penalty was saved by the stand in goalkeeper, but just a few minutes later Harwich took the lead as the away side were now in disarray. After the match we went back to Purfleet on the team coach (Max wall's et al) where sorrows were drowned by a seemingly inexhaustible supply of lager stashed on the coach and we finished the day very, very drunk in Purfleet's clubhouse.

I also heard that we "cruised" through to the 3rd round of the Combined Counties League Cup on Tuesday night and that we have a great draw in the F.A. Vase Second Round being at home to Bracknell Town.



Looking at the other Vase ties it is interesting that our 2nd round opponents last year, Moneyfields have to visit Chertsey. Also, bad news for A.F.C. Liverpool as they have been drawn away to A.F.C. Blackpool!

Talking of Liverpool (my wife's favourite club), I see that they have been taken over by the owners of the Boston Red Sox. Roy Hodgson commented that this would not affect the footballing side of things on the field, but looking at their predicted side for their next Premiership Game I see that Torres is in Right Field, Steven Gerrard is at Short Stop and Pepe Reina is now listed as the Catcher!

Now, today's article takes me back 20 years and to a quite remarkable F.A. Vase 4th Round tie. The year was 1990 and I was in my 13th year working at Smith New Court in the City of London. (They would later be taken over by the American bank Merrill Lynch who were in turn taken over by Bank of America at the end of 2008.)

One of my workmates was a guy named Jimmy Chapman. At that time he was the regular first team goalkeeper for the Ryman Division side Purfleet and he would later move on to Ford United where he became (and still is I believe) their chairman. I actually bumped into him a few months ago in a restaurant/bar at Borough Market, which reminded me of this tale.

Season 1990-91 saw Purfleet reach the 4th Round of the F.A. Vase, where they had a trip up the east coast to play Harwich & Parkeston at their Dovercourt Ground. Myself and another work colleague, Mark Lindsay decided to travel up to watch the game and to give Jimmy support.

We met at Liverpool Street station only to find that the line was up between Witham and the next station, so a bus journey was necessary between stations. This resulted at us arriving at Dovercourt station at ten past three and legging it down the hill to the ground. We arrived 15 or so minutes into the game and parked ourselves behind the goal that Jimmy was defending.

We hadn't missed anything and rest of the first half was uneventful apart from a few occasions when Jimmy was deliberately winding the home fans up behind the goal. (Jimmy was quite a character in those days and probably still is!)

At half time we amazingly managed to get a drink in the clubhouse bar and it was then that we noticed the strange sight of 10-12 guys (Purfleet fans) who were all dressed up identically as the legendary Max Wall, who was a comedian/clown famous for his silly walk.

The Molesey manager has written eloquently on the combined counties message board about the compelling drama of the cup-tie. Whilst not the greatest quality game, the sheer effort that both teams put into it and the twists and dramas of the extra time and the Germanic quality of our pens was awesome and compared to a Tuesday night slumped in front of the telly, it was a pleasure to be here.

We are planning other events that will be a bit of fun for all the family over the course of the year, including a quiz and much more besides. We always appreciate any comments or ideas, especially any help to get this all done.

Having said all of that, the most enjoyable way of bringing money into the club is to have a run in the Vase like last year so lets all support the boys up to and during the game against Bracknell in November. We had the pleasure of waiting for the draw in the Vase this Monday, and next Monday we find out who we get in the last 16 of the League Cup.

Also we have made around £ 600 profit towards the fundraising target for the club, which is a good start.



It's worth just taking a couple of paragraphs to explain what the Supporters Fundraising Group is and why we are doing this effort this season. The centre pages of this programme show our much beloved old ground at West Street in Ewell, and this is now our eighteenth season of ground sharing.

Whilst we like it here at Merstham and everything, facilities, catering and people compares very favourably with Banstead, circumstances forced us to move further away from our home borough. It is a sobering statistic that in my estimation six teams in this league play nearer to Epsom than Epsom and Ewell. This clubs long-term survival depends on getting back nearer our home.

To say this process has been stuck for a while is one of those great English understatements that foreigners who have not seen those "midnight on Friday in Hull City Centre " documentaries think we are still famed for.

Why we had to leave West Street and why it's taken ages to get back is rooted in the fact that non-league football is inherently uneconomic. I often glory in the supposed superiority of only paying £ 6 to watch players who are only earning a few quid play often good and entertaining football. It's a great hobby which I really enjoy but at the moment it's subsidised by interest on the sale of the money from our old ground.

If non-league football is inherently uneconomic, non-league clubs who don't have their own ground and clubhouse to generate income are particularly struggling. We had a range of discussions with the Limited Company on these issues last year. The result of those discussions is that supporters would like more communication, presence and evidence of progress on the ground search from the Company. The Company want evidence that the club will be able to fundraise and be viable in the future once relocated.

The supporters fundraising effort is our attempt to do our part of moving on the blockage and we do need your support to make a success of it. We've made a good start but we need more support .The target we have set ourselves of £ 7,000 is stiff but if achieved I believe could transform perceptions of this club and our prospects for the future in a way we all want.

To support us you don't need to do that much really. Following the golden goal bingo has become quite fun for people who were in the last quarter's contest.

Whitehawk Reserves 2-0 Epsom & Ewell Reserves - Suburban League Saturday 4th September 2010

Epsom & Ewell made their first competitive visit to Whitehawk for forty years as the Reserves looked to build on the three points gained in their opening victory the previous Saturday at East Grinstead Town.

Whitehawk took a 12th minute lead when a through ball caught the Epsom defence square, the Hawks forward muscling Prince Nsiah off the ball allowing him to have the opportunity to send in a probing cross that found the incoming centre midfielder with a powerful diving header from 10 yards that left youth keeper Charlie Burns unable to make a save.

Epsom & Ewell came close to an equaliser as Lee Binns disposed a dozing Hawks defender on the edge of the home box, the home keeper doing just enough to make Binns fire just over the bar. The home side took advantage of a poor offside trap on 37 minutes as the home centre forward was sent clear to bear down on the Epsom goal but Burns came out to close the angle and Panayi was able to track back to get an important block in as the Hawks forward prepared to pull the trigger.

Final action on the first half saw Epsom break the offside trap, Lester rifled in a dipping shot from 20 yards out that beat the keeper but curled wide of the far post by inches.

Half Time: Whitehawk 1 Epsom & Ewell 0

A Calvin Williams free-kick on 58 minutes into a packed home area saw Ralf Cambo rise but he was beaten to the ball by the punch of the Whitehawk goalkeeper putting the ball behind for a corner. Whitehawk should have been two up on 65 minutes as a well worked move spread the ball wide, the first time cross that flashed into the Epsom box finding the outstretched boot of the Hawks forward to divert the ball over Charlie Burns from 12 yards out with pace and spin that saw it clatter the face of the bar and fall kindly to Anthony Panayi to clear the loose ball.

Whitehawk once again broke the Epsom offside trap, the advancing Charlie Burns managing to get tangled with the Whitehawk midfielder, the Hawks player with an empty goal managed to roll the ball wide of the post somehow. Epsom failed to close the home centre forward a minute later on a dancing run through the Epsom box but Charlie Burns was equal to the effort as he blocked with his outstretched right boot.

Max Smith picked up a wayward pass allowing himself to drive towards the home goal on 83 minutes, the ball was slipped into Ralf Cambo, his effort from 10 yards out hitting the side netting.

Molesey Club History

due to business pressures but former Sutton United defender John Rains kept the momentum going and in what was an exciting season the club finished 8th in the Premier, their best ever league placing at the end of 1994/95.

Sadly Molesey lost the services of both Rains and Eede and two relegations in just three years saw them back where they were ten years earlier. South African businessman Clark joined the club in 1997 but departed in January 2004 after seven somewhat controversial years. Ray Best returned to the club during the ex-Football chairman's early years and his influence was again obvious as he took the side into the top half of Division One before a somewhat surprising departure, one which Molesey supporters found difficult to comprehend given the sides position at the time.

Several managers came and went during Clark's tenure at the club as Molesey fought to gain promotion once again and Pete Johnson was appointed as manager in May 2002; under his command the club enjoyed their best F.A. Cup run for ten years before defeat by Farnborough Town. A poor league run resulted in the resignation of Johnson in February and Ian Hazel took over but after guiding the side to safety with a run of just 2 defeats in their last 14 matches he walked away when he seemed set to lead us into the new campaign while Steve Moss's rein was brief and his departure both acrimonious and very public.

Everton and Wales legend Neville Southall took the reins on a caretaker basis, before the club appointed Steve Beeks as boss in October 2003. However, the club was shrouded in off-pitch problems, and following a long term investigation by the Football Association, who insisted the club hold an EGM, Norman Clark resigned as Club & Football chairman in January 2004. Beeks and his backroom team stayed on while off the field, there was tremendous progress around the ground by some amazing people and club volunteers. The much needed new clubhouse, driven by Chairman John Nunn, was finally opened in April 2006. The club was forced to significantly reduce its playing budget for the 2007/08 season, resulting in the resignation of Beeks, who felt he had taken the club as far as he could.

Ex reserve team manager Steve Webb was appointed as first team manager in the summer of 2007, and along with long-time assistant Pete Lelliott immediately set about rebuilding a squad that had been decimated following Beeks's departure. Sadly, the club struggled both on and off the pitch; key off-field personnel left during the summer and relegation seemed inevitable from an early stage, as the team begun the new year on a torrid run that saw them amass just 4 points from 16 games, culminating in relegation to the Combined Counties Leagues, a very hard pill for all to swallow after 30 years as an Isthmian League Club.

Webb continued as manager in 2008/09, once again assembling a squad virtually from scratch. His new-look side took time to adjust to life in the CCL, although a fine run either side of Christmas took the club to the outskirts of the promotion race, before injuries and loss of form took their toll, resulting in a mid table finish. The club enjoyed moderate success in cup competitions, reaching the semi finals of the League Cup, and bowing out of the FA Vase at the Third Round after a long trip into Norfolk to face Dereham Town. Last season with Webb continuing as manager, the Moles began the season with a settled side, a top six finish being the aim. After a dreadful start the ship appears to have been steadied, with the management and committee looking to set the foundations for a return to the Isthmian League, as well as establishing greater links to the community.

Molesey Club History

Molesey is both a village and a club steeped in history stemming back as far as the late 1800's and a Molesey side won the Surrey Junior Cup in 1913; it was in 1953 that the senior club was officially formed when Molesey St Pauls Utd joined forces with another Molesey village side to become Molesey F.C. The club spent its' early years in the Surrey Senior League with some degree of success in both league and cup competitions.

It was back in 1958 that the club last enjoyed a major honour when they won the Surrey Senior League just five years after their formation. Molesey FC enjoyed halcyon days in the early 60's with three appearances in the Spartan League Cup final and Jack Anders' Easter tournaments which featured both local and German sides were always both well supported and financially rewarding but there was little to cheer again until 1972 when the club reached the Spartan League final once again but lost to Bracknell Town at Egham Town FC.

John Sullivan was the man who changed the direction of Molesey F.C when he took over following the club's election to the Athenian League. A host of star names appeared for the club over the next few years including Cyrille Regis who later went on to England honours. Regis netted 27 goals in a very short time here before departing suddenly and unexpectedly to Hayes who quickly benefitted when they sold him for £5,000 to West Bromwich Albion. During Sullivan's reign Molesey enjoyed a fantastic record-breaking season in the Premier Midweek Floodlit League in 1976/77.

The club won 9 out of 10 group matches, broke the aggregate goal scoring record and when Chris Proctor netted five times against Hayes it was an individual scoring record. Despite Sullivan's obvious eye for good players and some excellent runs in the F.A. Vase Molesey failed to win a trophy during his time in charge although they did progress to the new Isthmian League set-up in 1977. They finished in the top half for the first four seasons and only missed out on promotion to Division One in 1978 when they drew 1-1 at home to Camberley in their final game, which they needed to win.

After Sullivan's departure a yo-yo existence followed for many years and the club almost went out of business during the mid 80's under the chairmanship of Graham Pearce; his untimely but ultimately necessary departure forced three long serving members to take over and those three gentlemen with the backing of the members saw the club through a tough period; what they did not know was how inspirational their decision to appoint Martin Eede was to prove. Eede arrived in 1987 and helped turned the club around. Together with right hand man Ray Best, Eede was responsible for a gradual improvement in the clubs playing fortunes and that improvement reaped due reward when Molesey were runners-up to Yeading in 1990 and gained promotion to division one.

Eede stepped aside to become football Chairman and Tony Dunne joined the club to lead them through an incredible spell; again with Ray Best in the backroom staff alongside Richard Higgs the club earned two Southern Combination Cup successes, promotion into the Premier and runners-up in the league cup final in 1993. This was the clubs best ever season and included a club record 11 straight league victories. This was also the season in which the club made its only foray into the 1st round proper of the FA Cup but they were beaten here by Bath City after a glorious run.

Off the field Eede became the principal figure in cajoling the clubs members and supporters through hours of hard work as they carried out the necessary ground improvements required for our promotion to the Premier Division. Dunne eventually left

Three Bridges Reserves 1-4 Epsom & Ewell Reserves - Suburban League Cup Saturday 18th September 2010

Epsom & Ewell's Reserves, on the back on their 1-0 win at Kiln Brow against Redhill on Monday night, travelled into mid West Sussex to face Suburban League Premier Division Three Bridges at the host's Jubilee Fields ground in the Suburban League Cup 1st Round. Epsom & Ewell have in the past number of seasons been drawn away at Suburban League Premier Division clubs and worked extremely hard each time only to find ourselves left heartbroken by an injury-time winner in extra-time at Fleet Town two seasons ago and losing a penalty shoot-out to Tooting & Mitcham United last season, but Epsom & Ewell made sure of a safe passage through to the second round with a 4-1 win.

Epsom & Ewell started tentatively as the hosts had the early possession and forced Jack Witts into an early save on 6 minutes as the Epsom keeper had to turn a low shot around the post for a corner. The nerves soon wore off for Epsom as the free-flowing play started to cause problems for the Bridges' defence and Lee Binns was played in on 12 minutes, his effort from 12 yards out was blasted just over the bar.

Epsom took the lead on 16 minutes as a cut back by Lester Boniface saw the Epsom number 8 swivel some 10 yards out to hook the ball home past a stunned home keeper and defence. Epsom threw out the old football cliché that you are at most danger of conceding immediately after scoring as Epsom quickly won the ball off Three Bridges from the restart, the ball was spread out to Boniface to cut into the box again and he managed to angle the ball back from roughly the same spot that he had set the first goal up from - this time he managed to find Lee Binns in support with a perfectly timed run, the visiting striker managing to loop the ball home from 10 yards out into the far corner of the net over the home keeper.

Epsom & Ewell's defence looked fairly comfortable as the first half continued - the majority of the sporadic Three Bridges attacks were mopped up very easily but Epsom & Ewell keeper Jack Witts was left exposed by his defence not closing the advancing home player down on 36 minutes, the rasping drive was kept out of the goal by Witts' acrobatic flying save to his right. Lee Binns was sent clear on 41 minutes and should have put Epsom three goals clear as he rounded the Three Bridges keeper only for a divot on the pitch to prevent the Epsom striker gaining a clean contact as the ball rolled agonisingly the wrong side of the upright.

An injury to Epsom centre-back Hesketh Johnson moments after Epsom's second goal that required him to receive treatment for a good three minutes played into Epsom's hands at the end of the first half as Epsom sprung the Three Bridges offside trap during the second minute of injury time to get in behind the home defence, the ball being cut back to the new centre-forward Kris Adewale to angle the ball home past the home keeper from 8 yards out.

Epsom & Ewell won a couple of early corners in the opening minutes of the second half but Three Bridges mopped each of these up with ease, the hosts then creating the first notable incident of the second half on 56 minutes, a free-kick deep into the Epsom box seeing the ball appear to be seen out for an Epsom goal kick but the referee immediately blowing his whistle and pointing to the spot adjudging by first reactions for pushing as the ball came in but then simulating that Epsom captain Peter Solomon's wrist had come into contact with the ball.

Three Bridges' bad day at the office was summed up by the penalty which admittedly was well taken although a good height for a keeper as an inspired Jack Witts flung himself acrobatically to his right to make a save with both fists behind the ball to give some justice to Epsom for what seemed a dubious penalty, although admittedly it was surprising that the referee did not ask the penalty to be taken again as it appeared at least two Epsom players were inside the box by the time the penalty was struck.

The Three Bridges defence were unable to deal with the aerial balls of Epsom throughout the majority of the match, a Prince Nsiah clearance from inside the Epsom area on 67 minutes landed just inside the hosts half, the bounce of the ball deceiving both centre-backs as Adewale found himself clear with only the keeper to beat, his effort from the edge of the Three Bridges box was blocked by the outstretched boot of the home keeper.

Three Bridges were thrown a lifeline on 74 minutes as a free-kick into the Epsom box saw Jack Witts call for the ball but a home midfielder managed to nip in front of Witts to nick the ball past the Epsom keeper from 7 yards out seeing the ball creep just inside the post. Rejuvenated from the goal and with Epsom tiring badly, Three Bridges were able to press Epsom back for a sustained couple of minutes as nerves started to show.

Epsom & Ewell were able to breathe easier again as the pressure was lifted with a solo goal by captain Peter Solomon on 81 minutes, Kelvin Williams laying the ball into Solomon who received it some 45 yards away from goal, but Solomon managed to evade one challenge and then side step the second attempted challenge as the Three Bridges midfielder lost his footing, the Three Bridges centre backs tried to get a tackle in but managed to comically take each other out seeing Solomon provided with a clear path into the home box where he rounded the Three Bridges keeper at walking pace who went to ground far too easily and early allowing Solomon the simplest of tasks to roll the ball into an unguarded net from 10 yards out.


W is for West Street. Unfortunately I never had the fortune to watch a proper Epsom home game. Hopefully we'll be back in the Borough soon though.

H is for Hoops. Blue and white in our case.


I is for Isthmian League. Promoted from Division 3 in 2001-02, winners of Division 2 in 1977-78 and runners up in Division 1 in 1983-84.

There was enough time for Epsom & Ewell to have a header cleared off the line on 87 minutes and a Lee Binns effort a minute from time to be tipped over the bar by the Three Bridges keeper.

Crawley Down Reserves 3-1 Epsom & Ewell Reserves - Suburban League Saturday 25th September 2010

Epsom & Ewell manager Bob Clarke made a number of changes to the starting line-up to the previous week as Anthony Panayi was once again available and youth defender Marcus Lovett was called in to make his Reserve team debut. Although the opening ten minutes were a tentative affair, Epsom & Ewell were the stronger of the two sides throughout the first half - the first notable moment occurring on 17 minutes when Epsom striker Kris Adewale managed to collect a long ball over the top from Peter Solomon, the volley from the edge of the box flying over the keeper but it would not dip quick enough as the ball clipped the top of the crossbar.

Epsom thought that they had opened the scoring on 23 minutes as Archie Okolie was threaded the ball by Dan Cormack. Okolie cut past two home players on his way into the box and he was given enough time to get away a shot from 12 yards out that he steered wide of the advancing keeper - the ball appeared to be rolling into an empty net but a despairing last ditch clearance almost of the goal line prevented Epsom from taking the lead.

Crawley Down had a rare visit into the Epsom & Ewell box on 27 minutes, the ball into the box seeing the home striker get a shot in but Matt Rains, son of former Epsom and Sutton player John, was back on the line to block the effort. Peter Solomon collected a misplaced Crawley Down pass on 28 minutes, his first time effort from 25 yards out seeing the home keeper parry the effort away from goal.

Epsom continued their sustained pressure, Peter Solomon releasing Archie Okolie to have a run at the Crawley defence; the home keeper comfortably saved his effort from 15 yards out. Lester Boniface cut in behind the home defence on 36 minutes, his layback finding Kris Adewale 10 yards out, the strike on target was parried wide of the upright for a corner by the home keeper. The deserved opener occurred on 43 minutes, Peter Solomon in the middle of the park spread the ball out to Archie Okolie to cut in once again behind the home defence, his cut back finding Kris Adewale to slot the ball home from 8 yards out.

Epsom looked destined to go in at half-time as the visitors goal had been hardly troubled in the opening 45 minutes, only for a bizarre 60 second period in the third minute of injury time - a long ball by the home side seeing the Epsom defence caught square, the Crawley Down striker racing to get to the ball ahead of Charlie Burns to flick it goal bound, the home players already starting to celebrate as the ball went past Charlie Burns but Marcus Lovett managed to get across and clear the ball off the line.

Crawley Down managed to quickly win the ball back, the ball being thrust back into the Epsom box, the diving header on the back post was blocked by the presence of Anthony Panayi, the follow-up shot from 12 yards out was blocked by Matt Rains' legs

seeing the loose ball run to the incoming Crawley Down midfielder to hit a rising shot from 15 yards out that beat Epsom keeper Charlie Burns to find the top corner of the net. On the balance of the play Epsom undeservedly found themselves going in at half-time level.

Half-Time: Crawley Down 1 Epsom & Ewell 1

Epsom & Ewell were desperate to get back ahead and came close on 51 minutes as Kelvin Nascimento threaded the ball into the path of Kris Adewale to outpace his Crawley Down marker, his effort from just inside the box once again sailed over a stranded home keeper and for the second time in the match clattered the crossbar when it looked like it was going to dip just under bar. Lee Binns collected a ball sent over the Crawley Down defence on 57 minutes, but the home keeper turned his effort around his near post.

The final half hour were a non-event for Epsom & Ewell for varying reasons that saw the home side boss the remainder of the game - the home side taking a 64th minute lead as a ball down the Epsom left wing saw Anthony Panayi outpaced by a Crawley Down midfielder making a 25 yard sprint before then turning the Epsom & Ewell youth captain allowing the home player to then have enough space and time to somehow beat E's keeper Charlie Burns on his near post.

The poor second half sportsmanship of the hosts without the match officials doing anything to stop it saw Epsom distracted as the play became progressively deeper and deeper in the Epsom half with substitute striker Phillip N'gbale along with Lee Binns see the service to them dry up.

Epsom's defending became more and more desperate seeing mistakes creep in that presented Crawley Down with chances but each one was over the crossbar. Crawley Down sealed the points on 81 minutes as the Crawley Down midfielder was presented with an opportunity to run straight down the left wing from just inside the Epsom half, cut in behind the Epsom defence and curl an effort into the far corner of the net from 10 yards out without a single player attempting to get a tackle in.

Lee Binns collected a through ball on 87 minutes, his cut back for Phillip N'gbale seeing the Crawley Down keeper bravely dive at the Epsom striker's feet to get both hands on the ball as it was about to find the leather of N'gbale's boot who would have had the simplest task from 8 yards out had the keeper failed to reach the ball.

The Epsom defence in disarray allowed Crawley Down to easily cut through the Epsom defence, the final effort from 8 yards out seeing Epsom keeper Charlie Burns manage to deflect the effort wide of the post for a home corner.

100 Memorable Matches

63 – Hounslow 2-6 Epsom F.C. - Corinthian League

Saturday 15th November 1952

In the 1952/53 season we were destined to finish third, which was our highest ever finish in that League before it merged with the Athenian and Delphian Leagues in 1963. Hounslow were the team to beat in the League, and they would finish above us again this year, although both were to be pipped by Carshalton Athletic's amazing late run that year. In addition Hounslow had defeated us in the Corinthian Memorial Shield Final of 1952 by two goals to one at Eastbourne, so they were almost a bogey side.

However, we had a striker back then by the name of Bill Goddard, and this season he would go on to score fifty-four goals in this 41 game season. This remains a post-war record, despite the best efforts of Tommy Tuite.

At this point in the season Goddard was in fine form. He had scored twice in a 2-2 draw with Grays Athletic, and followed this up with three consecutive hat tricks, against Guildford (7-0)(SSC), Chesham United (6-1) (L) and then against Hounslow as they were defeated 4-1 at West Street.

The vagaries of the League fixtures ensured that we were to play Hounslow in the return fixture just seven days later, but they never knew what hit them. Epsom were a goal up after just 40 seconds, 3-0 after 14 minutes and 5-0 up after just 32 minutes! Goddard scored his fourth straight hat trick that day against a side containing our future Manager the England Amateur International Derek Evans. It was Hounslow's worst ever defeat in the Corinthian League, and only the second time in six years that any team had done the double over them.

For the record Goddard scored another hat trick the following week, and the press went mad, saying that it was a World Record. What no one knew at the time though, was that it wasn't even a Club Record, as Reg Marlow had done exactly the same thing in his record-breaking season of 1926/27!!

62 – Epsom Town 5-3 Park Royal & Park Royal 1-2 Epsom Town

London League - Saturday 10th December 1932 & Thursday 27th April 1933

These two matches are grouped together as the Blues did the double over the all-conquering Park Royal team this season.

Park Royal were Epsom's nemesis during the thirties and undoubtedly denied them a move to the Athenian League that would have placed them on a level with some of the best non-league sides in the South, second only to the elite Isthmian League. The Royals won the London League on four straight occasions from 1931/32 to 1934/35 with the Blues second on three occasions and third once.

In 1930/31 they had won the lower division of the London League with ease, and 1931/32 they had won the League without losing a game, so when the Blues destroyed them 5-3 it was their first League defeat in nearly a season and a half.

Over the course of the season Park Royal would only lose three matches, two of them to the Blues, who recorded the first ever London League win at the Park Royal Stadium (which was in Coronation Road, North Acton) in three years by two goals to one, all scored in the first half. Leslie Marlow, Epsom's main striker back then did the damage with both goals either side of a Park Royal equaliser. A truly memorable achievement against a team that would only lose once in the following season, defeating an Epsom side that were good enough to reach the First Round of the F.A.Cup by 7-2 and 5-1!

100 Memorable Matches



What makes a memorable match?

A match can leave us with memories for a number of reasons. It could have been a big game like a cup final or promotion decider; it could have been a wild match with lots of goals, a big win, or even a heavy defeat. Add freak weather conditions, an odd refereeing decision, or just something a little bit special and you have a list of about 500 matches.

To try and get this list down to 100 has been an extremely difficult task. Occasionally I have put matches together for obvious reasons, as you'll find out over the course of the season, and by the end of the season, we'll find out which was top of the list.

64 – Sutton United 2-3 Epsom & Ewell - Surrey Senior Cup Second Round Tuesday 9th December 2008

Here is my personal favourite of all the matches that I have watched in my time with the club. When I started watching the Blues, we were of a similar level to Sutton United, usually just below, but not that far away. Many local matches had been played, and obviously there was a degree of dislike and rivalry. We were in a period of mourning at the club when they defeated Coventry City, and our much-missed former Secretary Dave Wilson had reputedly worn out his copy of the video of the Norwich City against Sutton United game from the next round that was won by the Canaries by eight goals to nil!

Part of our dislike probably stemmed from the fact that we hadn't beaten them home or away since 1981, when we won the Surrey Senior Cup by dispatching them 3-2 in the Semi-Final. This was just months before I started watching, so I had never seen us beat them, and no one at the club could remember our last win at Gander Green Lane which was in fact in a Surrey Charity Shield Match back in January 1933. Another reason for disliking them was that their main rivals were Carshalton. They didn't even know that we hated them and their team with a passion!

As a result of recent results and the two division gap, expectations were not high amongst the supporters, even after the goal of the season from Kyle Hough had put us ahead with an excellent clip across the keeper from the left wing while running at pace. He did it again later and saw the ball come back off the bar, but even as we approached half time, the lead was just for fun, and would surely be cancelled out.

After 39 minutes the inevitable happened, and Sutton then took the lead early in the second half. Myself and Steve Davies behind the goal thought that the game was up, and just waited for a third goal as they camped around our penalty area for a while. However, they never got through, and then ten minutes from time Dale Marvell broke away and slotted the ball beyond the keeper for the equaliser.

With only ten minutes remaining, the question was whether we could hold on for extra time, but Marvell had other ideas, and produced an almost carbon copy goal to put us ahead with just three minutes remaining. Suddenly we realised that the impossible was maybe achievable, and a few minutes later the whistle went. Fantastic, and well worth waiting twenty-seven years for!!

A pleasure to have travelled and competed.


