PRESIDENTS MESSAGE



Good Afternoon Everyone,

As I write this the postponed Olympic Games of 2020 has just begun in Japan, though I have to say that as with all sporting events that have taken place since the terrible coronavirus outbreak it doesn't seem quite real. It isn't just that the stadiums are empty or half-empty of spectators, it's that everyone who would have wished to have been there has been denied the choice. Not that this is in itself wrong in the circumstances – that can always be debated – but the negative consequences are undeniable. The game seems incomplete because the arena is incomplete. The results matter and yet they don't somehow, or they don't matter quite as much. What is revealed is that *taking part* matters most of all; taking part on the field of play, or being among a crowd, or being part of the wider crowd beyond with those inside the stadium representing them if you like.

It is perhaps little known that until 1948 alongside the track and field events medals could be won at the Olympics for five categories of art inspired by sport. Undoubtedly this was in the spirit of the Modern Games that were intended to be improving for both body and mind. At the 1920 Antwerp Olympics the French writer

Henri de Montherlant submitted a play about football along with some football inspired poems and others about boxing and women's athletics. Fourteen years later he wrote a story called *Football Lessons in the Park* in which a senior player talks to a junior contemplating the ninety minutes of a game of football. The older man accepts the effort and fatigue, the neglect of his own contribution to the glory of others and the sometime myopic officials because the reward is in *participation* regardless of outcome. In a wider sense we might see that as an apt metaphor for life. At ninety-two years old I'm not as match fit as I once was – and those of you who know me understand that I can no longer attend the matches (whereas I never used to miss any home or away) - but I'm still happy and thankful to be taking part in life one way or another and keeping in touch through modern media. Nevertheless, I'll miss being with you as a new season begins in a new league where we'll be reacquainted with old friends while looking forward to making new ones at unfamiliar grounds in glorious Sussex. But don't doubt I'll be participating with you in spirit offering good luck and good fortune to one and all!

EPSOM & EWELL

CLUB HISTORY 1918-2021

We were founded in March 1918 as Epsom Juniors Cricket Club and played throughout the summer. In the autumn, Epsom Juniors F.C. came into being. Competitive football followed as we entered the Surrey Junior League in 1919.

A change of name in July 1922 to Epsom Town F.C. heralded the start of a very successful era, we won three trophies that season, the Leatherhead Hospital Shield, the Sutton Hospital Cup, and the Epsom Hospital Cup. In addition, we also won the Sutton & District League, and under the forward thinking of their visionary Chairman Hugh Bradley, took the step into Intermediate Football, where we won the Southern Suburban League without losing a match. Senior football was granted as we were unanimously accepted into the Surrey Senior League for 1924/25.

In September 1925, the club relocated to the old Ewell F.C. ground at West Street, which was purchased through the generosity of our future President Robert Bradshaw. In 1925/26 the Championship of the Surrey Senior League was attained, and the following season, we defeated Egham 1-0 in the League Charity Cup to complete a League and Cup "double". Election to the London League followed, and the title was claimed in the first attempt in 1927/28.

The thirties were a very successful era, and we won the Surrey Charity (Senior) Shield in 1933 with an impressive 5-0 win over Woking. However, the proudest moment of our pre-war history was an appearance in the First Round Proper of the F.A.Cup in 1933/34. At the end of that season we changed our name to Epsom F.C.

The club competed continuously throughout the war years, winning the Surrey Combination in 1939/40. After the war, Epsom F.C. restarted, continuing in the London League and reclaimed West Street.

In 1949 we entered the Corinthian League, where in 1954 we reached the Surrey Senior Cup Final for the second time in our history, losing unluckily 2-0 to Corinthian Casuals in front of 6,159 at Selhurst Park. In 1955 we won the Surrey Senior Shield with a 1-0 win over Carshalton Athletic.

We appointed our first ever Manager, Kingstonian legend Doug Whitehead in 1955 and in 1960 we finally raised the Shield with a 2-0 win over Maidenhead. We changed our name once again to Epsom & Ewell F.C.

We joined The Surrey Senior League and the new squad, including young striker Tommy Tuite, won the League Cup, and in, 1974/75 achieved a second Surrey Senior League "double". However, the season would always be remembered for reaching the Final of the inaugural F.A. Vase, where 9,500 saw the Blues edged out 2-1 by Hoddesdon Town at Wembley Stadium. The Athenian League welcomed us back, and promotion was achieved in that first season. In 1977 we were invited to play in the Isthmian League and the title was clinched the following

April, securing a move to Division One. In 1979/80 we won the Southern Combination Cup 7-2 over Hampton. We finally won the Surrey Senior Cup in 1981, defeating Woking 2-1.

In 1993 a large chapter in our history ended as we left West Street and moved in as tenants of Banstead Athletic. The decade was largely one of frustration.

In 2002 Adrian Hill took us back up to the newly created Division 1 South, but Hill's retirement at the end of the season led to relegation a year later and then in 2006 we were transferred into the Combined Counties League Premier Division. In October 2006 Lyndon Buckwell in 2009/10 the club reached the last 32 of the F.A.Vase In April of 2010 we terminated our ground sharing agreement with Banstead Athletic and spent two seasons at Merstham F.C. before relocating to High Road, home of Chipstead F.C. for the 2012/13.

The season brought a club record 12 straight League wins. We defeated South Park 3-0 to win the Combined Counties League Cup.

In September Lyndon Buckwell departed and Glyn Mandeville and Matt Smith took over.

In the summer of 2016 our club visited France and played a friendly against our twin town Chantilly, which was where the England team had been based before their Euro 2016 campaign. The players were able to meet Roy Hodgson and Gary Neville and performed admirably as ambassadors for our town.

In 2016/ we reached the League Cup Final but were defeated 4-1 by Westfield.

In the summer of 2017, we suffered a large player exodus with a substantial number joining local rivals Sutton Common Rovers. Glyn was unable to replace them with enough players of real quality and three quarters of the season was spent at the foot of the table. His resignation in January 2018 led to the club promoting our Coach Neil Grant into the Manager's role although he managed to get us off the foot of the table we were relegated.

Neil departed in October. He was replaced by Simon Funnell, who stepped up from his Assistant role and oversaw a good run of results which took us the Division One League Cup Final. Unfortunately the new season of 2019/20 started poorly and Funnell resigned at Christmas. His Assistant Sam Morgan was appointed to the role and with his new Assistant Tim Moffatt they oversaw an undefeated league run that took us up to the abandonment of the season.

The 2020/21 season commences with another ground move, this time to Leatherhead's Fetcham Grove ground.

We now look forward to our new adventure joining the Southern Combination Football League.

SEAFORD TOWN

CLUB HISTORY

Seaford Town was first founded in 1888 as Seaford F.C. allegedly succeeding the first competitive Seaford club, the Seaford Rovers FC. Who were founded around 1882. In 1910 Seaford FC won the Sussex Junior Cup. Like all Sussex clubs they didn't play any games during The first world war and part of their pitch was dug up to grow food.

After the Great War, Seaford FC played in the Mid Sussex League and won the Montgomery Cup in 1936 and 1939, but again the club had to stop playing games due to World War 2.

After the Second World War, they were among the founding members of the Sussex County League Division Two in 1952.

They won promotion to Division One in the 1963–64 season and were an ever-present in the top division until being relegated in 1971. During that period they achieved their highest ever league position – 4th place in 1965–66.

The club left the County League in 1978 but rejoined as of the founder members of the new Division Three in 1983. Seaford Town won Division Three in 1985–86 and followed up this success with winning the Division Two title in 1988–89 earning promotion back to the top flight. This spell in Division One only lasted two seasons before they were relegated back in 1991 after finishing 17th. Further relegations followed in 1992–93 and in 1996–97 which saw the club leaving the Sussex County League altogether.

After two seasons in the East Sussex League, they regained their County League status and also changed their name to just **Seaford** as opposed to 'Seaford Town' as they merged with the youth sides **Seaford Seagulls** which had teams ranging from under 7s all the way through to under 16s. This saw Seaford change from their traditional all red strip, to a red shirt with blue sleeves and blue shorts. Seaford was changed back to Seaford Town in 2005.

Seaford were promoted to Division Two in 2000–01 where they have been ever since, with 6th being their best finish achieved in 2004–05 and 2006–07 (adopting the "Town" suffix once more in 2005).

The club installed floodlights at their ground (which is known as 'The Crouch') for the 2007–08 season and won their first game under the floodlights with a 3–2 win against Lancing in the league.

The club have only competed in the FA Vase on two occasions – a Preliminary Round defeat at the hands of Cowes Sports in 1975–76, but after the erection of the floodlights, became eligible for the national competition from the 2008–09 season and were subsequently knocked out by Chichester City United in the Preliminary Round that season. After recent ground improvements the club has once again entered the competition.

The crest of Epsom & Ewell Football Club is circular. It features a central shield with a mountain peak and wavy lines below it. The shield is flanked by two flags. The text 'EPSOM & EWELL' is written in a semi-circle at the top, and 'FOOTBALL CLUB' is at the bottom. The year '1918' is inscribed at the very bottom of the crest.

BACK TO THE BOROUGH

We are your local non- league football club and have been for 103 Years, we want to come back to the borough.

Our Vision is to create an inclusive community based multi-sports complex for all.

Epsom & Ewell Football Club was founded in 1918 making the club 103 years old.

Our last home ground of 68 years was in West Street, Ewell which sadly, we vacated in 1993.

We have not played in the Borough of Epsom & Ewell for 28 years and counting. Since then, we have been a nomadic club, playing at various different grounds outside the borough. Our intention now is to bring the club home to be at the heart of the community.

The aim is to establish a community focused Football Club & Sports Hub in the Borough for the provision of sports for the whole community to enjoy. We want to achieve and promote, not just a home for the football club, but an inclusive centre of excellence for all sports in the borough. We hope that this will encourage those who live or work in and around the borough to participate in a healthy lifestyle and improve mental wellbeing through participation in all sports.

We have identified the Hook Road Arena as the only viable site in the borough suitable to accommodate our needs.

The key to achieving our objective is to obtain permission from Epsom & Ewell Borough Council over tenure of the site, be granted a lease and then to gain planning permission to develop the site.

Despite the difficulties and restrictions of the pandemic, the committee has been busy over the last 9 months and we are currently having informal discussions with Epsom & Ewell's Head of Planning regarding the Hook Road Arena.

We are well advanced with our plans for the site and our partnership with the other sports bodies in the borough that will form part of this Community Development.

Our progress depends on the outcome of our discussions with Epsom & Ewell Borough Council and their willingness to help and support us to achieve our goal.

MATCH REPORT

*Epsom & Ewell FC
v Lordswood FC*

Saturday 24th July 2021

Epsom & Ewell FC made the trip to north Kent to play our last pre-season friendly against Lordswood FC who play in the Southern Countries East League Premier Division. The threatened thunderstorms fortunately stayed away for our first visit to the Bill Bishop Stadium

Sam Morgan continued to shuffle his squad around after the defeat to Spelthorne Sports FC only 48 hours before. There were no official team sheets issued so it is not possible to be too certain as to exactly who was on the pitch at any one time (so apologies for any inaccuracies in this report!) but one change was definitely Dan Smith in goal that would prove to be vital as the match concluded. The rumours in the stands was that the home team had seven first XI squad players missing and had called up a couple of the under 18s but this was clearly still a strong squad.

There was not much in the early exchanges between the two sides but the Epsom front line of Luke Miller, Josh Uzun and Aimon Salmi looked particularly threatening. This reaped benefits in the 18th minute when a fairly harmless looking attack by Epsom led to Josh Uzun lobbing the home goalkeeper from just within the Lordswood half. Think Czech Republic v Scotland in the Euro's and you won't be too far away. A superb effort that was definitely intended. Epsom held the lead to half time and went in 1-0 up.

The second half started with Epsom

conceding possession in their own half a couple of times but some excellent defending meant no harm came of the Lordswoods attacks. Mid-way through the half, there was frenzy in the Epsom penalty box until the referee blew his whistle and pointed to the penalty spot. No idea what he had seen but it was certainly a soft penalty that got converted to make it 1-1.

Epsom appeared to recover quickly and got back on the attack with some good play. A quick movement down the left wing led to a cross hitting a Lordswood hand in the box for a penalty to Epsom this time. Josh Uzun easily dispatched the penalty after missing one against Lingfield last Saturday.

The rest of the half played out fairly equally until the three minutes of injury time. Lordswood hammered a header against the bar from a corner and then right at the death, a Lordswood free kick from the edge of the Epsom box was heading in for the equaliser before Dan Smith managed to get a strong hand to it and divert it round the post. Superb save.

All in all, a 2-1 victory was more than deserved for Epsom who played strongly against the Step 5 team, looked exciting going forward and much more solid at the back than in the previous game. All bodes well for the start of the season and confidence should be high for successful months ahead.

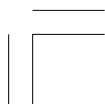
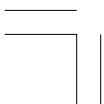

2) Pre-Match Instructions

Team sheets are to be presented to the Referee at the allotted times prior to kick off by the Manager / Assistant Manager (the person who will be in the Technical Area throughout the game) no one else.

This will be noted on the Referee return card and points added to the Respect Merit table if the incorrect person attends. NOTE:- At present this is still to be carried out in an open area whenever possible.

3) Technical Area's – Instruction poster attached with this e-mail.

The same system as previous seasons will apply with a warning sent to the club for the first offence and then a stepped fine from £25 to £100 for any further offences plus points added to the Respect Merit table.

The poster attached explains what must happen if a person is removed from the Technical Area for any reason (ie misconduct etc), ensure all your Managers are fully aware of the consequences.

NOTE:- Again at present It is acceptable to have an extended "Technical area" for social distancing but the perimeter/s of this must be CLEARLY marked on the ground.

IMPORTANT:- This poster is mandatory and Must be displayed in both the home & away changing rooms and the Referee's room. Your club will be fined if this poster is not displayed as stated.

4) Match Respect Marks

This system for Referee's to give a mark between 1 & 5 for Respect of their decisions throughout the match is for all teams in the club – including the U-18's Youth League. If this applies to your club please ensure that your Youth setup is fully aware and receives a copy of this letter.

An average mark of 3.5 is the standard required for a club, below this will add points to the Respect Merit table and an average mark of 4 and above will have points taken off the Respect Merit table at the end of each period.

5) Referee's Match Card

It is the clubs responsibility to collect the match card return slip from the Referee (it includes a column for "Sin Bin" offences for all teams as last season, so you must have new cards) you will see that it states the card must be filled in by the Referee "immediately after the game" therefore whoever is collecting the card should not have to wait any more than 10 minutes.

As last season it will state either "Satisfactory" or "Unsatisfactory" for your Technical Area this can be discussed if the dialogue is constructive and polite not otherwise.

Also as already mentioned, it will also state whether the correct person had attended the pre-match instructions.

6) Respect Merit Table

The points system will work the same as last season and it will show "Sin Bin" offences, with all the columns showing any additional points for Technical Area/Pre-match offences and additions/ deductions for average Match Respect marks at the end of each period. In addition those clubs at the top of the table (ie highest points) and those clubs who remain at the top will be subject to the following procedure:-

1) The club will be written to asking how they are going to address the reasons for their high points score.

The actions implemented by the club will be monitored over a period to ensure an improvement, if there is no improvement then:-

2) The club will be called in for a League Respect hearing in which it will be agreed a way forward and a time period in which the improvement will start to show in the points score, if there is still no improvement then:-

3) The club will be required to hold a Respect Workshop within 2 months run by the Sussex County FA at the club's premises ensuring the club meets the Sussex County FA's minimum requirement for attendance and paying a fixed fee of £75 for two County FA representatives to run the workshop.

Note:- If necessary this final procedure will be repeated until the club show an improvement in their points score.

There are no changes this season to all the points added/deducted they remain the same as last season.

The points added/deducted on the table will be as follows:-

Cautions – Respect = +5 points (C2/Sin Bin), All others = +1 point.

Sending off – Respect = +10 points (S2, S3, S6), All others = +4 points.

Misconduct – Points will vary from +4 points to +20 points depending on the severity of the offence.

No above offences in a week = -1 point per team per game played during the week.

Incorrect person at the pre-match instruction = +2 points.
Unsatisfactory Technical Area = +5 points.

Match Respect Mark at the end of a period/season – 4.00 or over = -5 points
