A message from Ian Lamont, son of Stella

Good Evening Everyone,

I used to love playing football. I wasn't much cop, but that didn't stop me. Every school break, every day. I'd even kick the Christmas balloons around the house until they deflated. And I'd be first up to take a penalty. Usually missed it. Put it too close to the keeper, and never learned. Like I say, wasn't much cop.

Stella, whose eponymous trophy is being played for tonight, was my mother. She was a fixture at Epsom & Ewell as supporter, committee member and co-editor of the programmes for a good half-century, ending her days as club President. While she was well, she never missed a game, home or away. When she became ill, she kept quiet about it, told few people. She died last year on Armistice Day aged ninety-five.

I wonder, did she kindle my interest in football? Or did I find that mine chimed with hers? Hard to say. I don't know. Football was somehow always in the air (she became properly involved in youth football as well). One thing's for sure, her enthusiasm back-dated mine by multiple years.

She watched games in London at grounds without floodlights when terraces were hills, actual hills. And these were professional clubs.

What she liked most, though, was the amateur game. To be fair she wasn't cut out for the barbarity of professional football. She didn't want to yell abuse at anyone; thought it a weakness; the justification of a crowd. It creates an atmosphere, granted, but comes at a cost. What she found at the amateur level was a camaraderie, not just between a club's supporters but between supporters of different clubs.

Bit fanciful, I suppose, and not universal, but mostly holds good. You see it when a club folds, or looks like it could. There's a rallying round, an understanding of what a club means to its community. Torquay might be half way across the country, and where on earth is Barrow? but you still want them to be in business, even if you'd sooner beat them on a match day, and they you.

So, she would have appreciated tonight's match played against the Casuals, a club that was created out of and with luck still embodies that spirit of co-operation and shared resolve.

It's reckoned you're remembered for forty years on average after you've died. That's a leveller, isn't it. Stella's name is engraved on a trophy which began as a tribute and is now a memorial.

It was a delight for her when she was alive, and she'd be pleased to think of it carrying on. One day it'll be retired, I imagine, and the tribute passed to someone else. She would have understood that. It might be a single game played in her name today but the wider game is for everyone.

All can take part in one form or another, on the pitch, off the pitch.

All can cheer.

The game is for everyone.

Always.

Match report

In our final match of the season, we faced off against Guildford City at The Spectrum sports centre in Guildford. The unique layout of the pitch, set across an 8-lane athletic track, meant spectators were quite a distance from the action, adding an extra layer of challenge for the fans viewing.

Guildford City approached the game with a sense of urgency, knowing a positive result could secure their safety from relegation. Meanwhile, our own relegation fears had been put to rest earlier in the week, thanks to Tadley Calleva's victory over Colliers Wood.

Despite being plagued by injuries and absences, our squad entered the match with determination. With a depleted bench, including reserve goalkeeper Toby Colwill donning an outfield number, our resources were stretched thin.

The match unfolded on a pitch showing signs of wear and tear, contributing to a tense and scrappy affair. Despite the conditions, we asserted ourselves as the more composed side, seizing the lead through Sirak Negassi's clinical finish after a well orchestrated corner. The home supporters were immediately checking all forms of social media to see how their relegation rivals were doing after this setback.

Guildford City responded with determination, twice rattling the woodwork before half-time. However, we maintained our slender lead going into the break.

The second half mirrored the first, with neither team able to seize control amidst persistent rain adding to the challenge. A defensive lapse on our part allowed Guildford City to draw level in the 71st minute, injecting a sense of uncertainty into the match.

Surprisingly, as the clock wound down, Guildford City seemed content to play for a draw, aware that results elsewhere had secured their safety from relegation. The final whistle blew with both teams settling for a 1-1 draw, much to the jubilation of the home side, who celebrated their narrow escape from the drop.

Despite the lackluster spectacle on the pitch, we secured a respectable 16th place finish in the division. As we look ahead to the future, we anticipate an exciting transition to sharing grounds with Corinthian Casuals, who will be joining us in the division following their relegation from the Isthmian South-Central Division.

It was just before the half-time whistle went when the home side doubled their lead on the Tilbury turf where they groundshare, after a corner was floated towards the back stick, fired back across the face by Hirst, and Dariri was on hand to tuck it home. As the second 45 got underway, this fast-paced encounter lost its momentum slightly as Casuals looked to find a way back into the game, but Mu's men were reduced to 10 just after the hour mark, after midfielder Malachi Hudson was sent off for a late challenge. Despite playing with a man less in the hot sun around the Tilbury Docks, Casuals dug in and fought hard. Substitute Jensen Allchurch pulled out a 25-yard thunderbolt destined for the top pins to reignite the visitors' dreams of a comeback. The missile stunned Grays slightly, as the fighting spirit led to a flurry of late chances for Corinthian, but it wasn't meant to be – a late lay-off from Gordon into the path of Joe Damrell allowed him to raffle a low half-volley into the bottom corner and seal the win for the hosts.

Despite the result, Mu remained upbeat afterwards. "The boys played well," he said. "You can clearly see the style of football we're trying to play, so overall very happy with the performance. Obviously with 10 men, it was more difficult, but even then the boys showed resilience and were very solid. It changes the

whole aspect of the game, but sometimes that happens in football, and we've got to react straight away. "We're looking forward to the next games. I feel like the more games we play, the better we'll get. The boys love to play so the quicker they come, the better for us!"

Yesterday marked the dawn of a new era under the management of Corinthian-Casuals fans' favourite Mu Maan.

We faced Grays Athletic in our first pre-season game under the sunny Essex sky, and the squad

made the trip up to the Thames Estuary in high spirits, producing a positive display against Step 4 opposition.

The last two campaigns have been tough for the club. Back-to-back relegations have



left supporters frustrated, while managerial uncertainty during that period meant that we haven't reached the heights that our rich history might suggest. But on May 15th, Mu Maan returned to his old stomping ground, where he racked up 153 appearances and 20 goals in the pink and chocolate, scoring some crucial strikes in the process. With a new manager and a different crop of players, there are hopes that a more exciting chapter lies ahead for the club.

Gavin Rose, top manager, at Dulwich Hamlet – a young, knowledgeable manager, Jamie Howell, at Bognor Regis – exactly the same. Jim Cooper, at Met Police, was another top manager, but he taught me in a different way. Mick Sullivan, at Leatherhead, had an unbelievable squad and he knew just to let us play our football. I feel like I've picked up bits from all of those managers along the way and learned from them. Now I've got my own philosophy, my own beliefs, and I'm going to try and implement that.

> **What would be your message to the supporters about what they can expect?**
First and foremost, to the supporters, I want to say you're in good hands. You have a man here who cares for this club. I love this club and I want to bring success back to the club, because I feel the fans deserve that. I know the fans, I know what they're like and they deserve success again. I don't really want to speak about the last two years, because we all know what's happened, but I'm here to change that and give them something they can actually shout about.

WELCOME BACK MU MAAN



> Mu, welcome back to Gornithian-Casuals, as manager. How does that sound?

Amazing. I'm delighted to be given this opportunity. First and foremost, and thank you to Brian Adamson for that. This club is a place that I call home, it's my local club and it feels great to be here.

> What are your abiding memories of this place and what kind of an atmosphere do you associate it with?

I ended my career here under James Bracken and, to give credit where it's due, what he had here was unbelievable. I've been around non-league football for a long time and I feel like they were the best years of my footballing life. The fans were unbelievable, they would come out in numbers, even on Tuesday nights, away from home, they would still turn up. I am trying to bring that back.

> You know the potential of this club. Where do you want to take it?

Wow, what a question! It might sound mad, but I think we can take this club wherever we want to. The club has got fantastic people behind the scenes and I feel like, with what I will bring as well – I'm a young manager and I'm hungry, very committed – we can go wherever we want to take this.

> What has been the first stage of your plan upon taking over as manager?

Having the right people around me. I need strong people around me, people that I can trust. That's always the case, whether it's business, whether it's life, and football is no different. That is the foundation – having people around you who will be there for you when you need them to be.

> Mu the player was gifted, committed, and had a knack of popping up with a contribution at key moments. What is Mu the manager shaping up to be?

Listen... I'll leave you to be the judge of Mu the player! This is something that is massive to me, it's not new to me, but of course managing a team is completely different to playing. I will approach it with hard work, commitment, morals, standards. Those are the principles and if you do those things right, and have the foundations right, then I feel like we'll be alright.

> You've named James Bracken and Brian Adamson already, and you've worked with a few other well-respected non-league managers in your time. Have they influenced you?

Of course. You live, you learn, you pick up bits here and bits there, and you put your own twist on it.

The Corinthian-Casuals committee have also been very busy this summer, as the chairman organised regular work parties at the ground on Saturdays throughout the close season. You'll see the difference a few fresh coats of paint can make, but most strikingly you'll notice we have replaced the perimeter fencing surrounding the pitch thanks largely to a successful application for a grant from the Football Foundation as part of the Premier League's Stadium Fund. Those fence panels now allow us to display dibond pitchside hoardings for our sponsors and local businesses who wish to advertise here.

It is a sign of the ambition of this committee that we can now boast new sponsors for the front and back of our men's team shirts, as well as a new stadium sponsor. We welcome Skip It, Armada Group and Horizon on board and look forward to a good working relationship with all our new partners. The Salts have been without a home ground of their own since moving out of their West Street ground in 1993 and have since shared with a number of local clubs, most recently Cobham.

We believe their move to Tolworth Epsom & Ewell – will be beneficial to both clubs and we look forward to enjoying a close working relationship with their committee, staff and supporters.

As the Salts chairman, Mel Tough, announced upon the completion of the agreement: "This is a fantastic opportunity for Epsom & Ewell to be at the closest ground to our borough. IN MEMORIAM

It has been a summer punctuated by sadness for Corinthian-Casuals as we mourned the passing of several much-loved figures.

Billy Smith was the manager who led us from perennial strugglers to over-achievers during his time in charge between 1981 and 1984. He was the last man to lead us to the first-round proper of the FA Cup, where we took Bristol City to a replay in 1983, with a team that featured the likes of Alan Pardew, Andy Gray and Tony Finnigan. All of whom went on to play for Crystal Palace, as well as Gary Cascoe, the father of our current forward, Shea Cascoe-Rogers. Billy was a huge character, greatly respected on the non-league scene, and also managed the likes of Dulwich Hamlet, Kingstonsian, Tooting & Mitcham, Carshalton Athletic and Crawley Town. He passed away in May from each of the clubs where he made an impact spoke volumes for his achievements and his popularity in the game.

Gerry Young, our former assistant manager and loyal supporter, also passed away in May, at the age of 75. Gerry was a popular figure at the club, someone who could be relied upon to offer stoic words of comfort during the tougher periods. He had seen it all in the game and formed part of a group of former players who remained staunch supporters. Gerry was part of the Tolworth FC setup who played at King George's before our amalgamation with them in 1988, and then remained as assistant manager of Corinthian-Casuals after we took over the lease on the ground that summer. His loyalty, consistency of character and dedication to the club remained undimmed throughout the decades that have followed and his passing will leave a void that we can never fill.

Keith Webb, who passed away at the end of June, was one of our most popular supporters and a face that every regular at King George's Field recognised. He supported his club through thick and thin, standing behind the goal in his Casuals shirt, surrounded by family and friends. It is through speaking to loyal fans like Keith that you best understand the mood of the club in general. Often he didn't need to say anything, his expression said it all – unbridled joy and colour in his cheeks when times were good, world-weary resignation when we were enduring tougher spells. That was because he cared. He truly loved this club. We will miss them all dearly, but we won't forget their contribution to Corinthian-Casuals. Rest in peace, gents.

Corinthian-Casuals Manager

These are my first programme notes as Corinthian-Casuals manager, and I'm absolutely delighted to be in this position. I'd like to begin by welcoming you all to this pre-season friendly against Epsom & Ewell, who will be grounds sharing with us for the next couple of seasons.

It is a special feeling to be managing the club where I played for so long and I think we've put together a talented, competitive squad, with a good balance of youth and experience.

I'm happy with the way pre-season has gone, especially when you take into consideration that we've practically got a whole new squad. Last month, these players didn't really know each other and, as a management group, we are happy with how they've applied the work that we've done.

I'd like to introduce the coaching staff. First, there's Gabriel Odunaike, my assistant manager. The fans will know Gabs, he also loves this club and he knows non-league well, he's coached in his own right and, like all the coaches, is someone I can trust completely. Richard Blackwell has been around non-league for a long time as well, he's captained Sutton United and with his experience of the game, the younger boys will learn a lot from him. We've got my brother Mo Maan, who has been around non-league too, got promoted with Met Police and knows this club well. Alan Bray is another first-team coach who also captained Sutton United and was a very good defender. He's played at a high level, is someone I know well, and is a good person to have around.
